ATRIUM AT GREENOCK CREEK

CHRISTABELLE COTTAGE

Marriage proposals, weddings, perhaps even the odd conception (of the nonimmaculate kind) . . . you name it, it's happened at Christabelle Cottage, a delightfully renovated circa 1849 church in the small town of Lyndoch in SA's Barossa Valley. And it's not hard to imagine why. The ironstone exterior and cornucopia of posies and fresias that line the garden paths make for a romantic weekend retreat of the highest order. One of the oldest buildings to be found in SA, it's designed to cater to total indulgence, with no lack of provisions in the gorgeous Baltic pine kitchen. Its elegant cathedral ceilings, open log fire and stone floors make the place neither "churchy" nor austere, while the sun-filled atrium and four-person spa bath lure guests back year after year. If you can find the strength to drag yourself away from the charms of Christabelle, the gourmet delights of the Barossa are at your disposal. We've found a small slice of heaven. Amen. DUMAS HOUSE

Charles Dumas was something of a pioneer in the Mt Barker area in the Adelaide Hills. He founded the local Mt Barker Courier newspaper in the 1860s, which remains alive and well today, and in fact his son went on to become the legendary Sir Lloyd Dumas, MD of The Advertiser, AAP chairman, Australian Reuters director and many other illustrious positions. Their now heritage-listed home on Druids Ave was painstakingly restored and re-opened by Dayne Bartlett in 2006, and it now provides a warm and welcoming opportunity for visitors to relive the Dumas family's glory days. Historic touches and Courier memorabilia are

scattered throughout the three-bedroom home, which doesn't want for mod-cons either. But it's the lovely gardens that really capture your attention. In particular, the tremendous century-plus English Oak that dominates the backyard, which is also heritage-listed in its own right. Historic Hahndorf is ten minutes down the road, along with all the delights of the Adelaide Hills food and wine region. Details // Druids Ave, Mt Barker, SA, From \$245 per night.

SEPPELTSFIELD VINEYARD COTTAGE

When Prussian settlers Christian and Louise Hemmerling came to SA in search of a better quality of life, they found it on the fertile land of Greenock Creek in the Barossa Valley. One of their eight children and her new husband lived in a cottage nearby, where they raised five children of their own, and where the husband worked at the nearby Seppelt Winery as a Cellarman. Four generations later, Seppeltsfield Vineyard Cottage still stands and, although its simple stone structure and mud and wood-beamed ceilings are clues to its history, the current owners have turned it into a gorgeous boutique holiday home for two. The cottage is these days a far cry from what its earlier hard-working inhabitants would have known, but the views, the peace and quiet and the fresh country air are timeless. BEACH HUTS MIDDLETON


Load the car with buckets, spades and sunhats: you're off to visit the Beach Huts in Middleton for the quintessential seaside experience. Sandwiched halfway between Victor Harbor and Goolwa on the Fleurieu Peninsula, this too-cute-for-words outfit consists of 12 spacious, self-contained and beautifully decorated beach huts, sleeping between two and five, all en-suite, and some with outdoor spa. Named after 12



















famous Australian beaches, each hut has a seaside theme but with differing décor; the individual flourishes (driftwood furnishings, pot plants, chequered tablecloths and wall hangings) are exquisite. Brekkie provisions are supplied daily and some huts have a fully equipped kitchen, but if you tire of cooking then the award-winning Blue Restaurant is just 50m away, where a drink on the deck is the perfect way to watch the sun go down. BIRKS RIVER HOUSE

In 1910 a wealthy businessman named Napier Birks came across a leafy spot on the banks of the Murray near Goolwa, and set about building a home, a boathouse and a private marina, which he would modestly

name Birks Harbour. In the years after Napier's death, the three properties succumbed to subdivision and disrepair, but have since been reunited, restored and refurbished. Now the trio of two holiday homes and a working marina are once more as attractive a river precinct as you could hope to find on the whole of the Murray, In 2009, Birks' original home was converted into two luxurious self-contained retreats and renamed Birks River House. The Garden Retreat sleeps four and has French doors overlooking the grounds, while the smaller Riverview Retreat is on a mezzanine level with a balcony overlooking the Murray. Both are open-plan and spacious, decorated with original artwork, and share a terraced pool and relaxation deck. Details // Liverpool Rd. Goolwa, SA. From \$250 per night, www.

DEEP CREEK RETREAT

This is a holiday home for which the absence of plasma screens, iPod docks, gourmet kitchens and spa baths is the selling point. Deep Creek Retreat on SA's Fleurieu Peninsula is built on sustainable principles and is completely solar-powered a place to switch off the mobile and the laptop and to savour the simple life for a week or two. With a comfortable but sparsely styled interior, sheets of glass for walls, a view out over valley meadows, orchards and olive groves, and surrounded by a walled country garden, this abode makes honest use of the word "retreat". Forget having to race the other vacationers to bag the best spot on the beach; the only other guest you'll be crossing swords with is Mother Nature, and maybe the odd kangaroo.
